Hemorrhoids can further be classified by severity into grades:

**Grade I:** No prolapse; visible only during an anoscopic examination.

**Grade II:** Prolapse during defecation but spontaneously reduce.

**Grade III:** Prolapse that requires manual reduction.

**Grade IV:** Irreducible prolapse, often accompanied by thrombosis or ulceration.

### Causes

Hemorrhoids result from increased pressure in the anorectal region, leading to vascular engorgement and tissue prolapse. Common causes include: Chronic Constipation or Straining: Increased intra-abdominal pressure during defecation. Prolonged Sitting: Decreased venous return, leading to engorgement of venous plexuses. Pregnancy: Hormonal changes and increased pressure on pelvic veins. Obesity: Increased intra-abdominal pressure. Low-Fiber Diet: Associated with harder stools and straining. Heavy Lifting: Causes straining and pressure on the venous system. Aging: Weakening of supportive tissue structures.

### Pathophysiology

Vascular Engorgement: Increased pressure leads to dilation and engorgement of the hemorrhoidal venous plexus. Internal Hemorrhoids: Originate from the superior hemorrhoidal plexus above the dentate line and are covered by mucosa. External Hemorrhoids: Originate from the inferior hemorrhoidal plexus below the dentate line and are covered by skin. Inflammation and Prolapse: Chronic pressure weakens the supporting connective tissue, causing hemorrhoidal cushions to prolapse. Thrombosis: Acute thrombosis within hemorrhoidal veins can occur, leading to severe pain and swelling. Bleeding: Fragile and engorged vessels are prone to rupture during defecation.

### Clinical symptoms

Hemorrhoids are swollen and inflamed veins located in the lower rectum and anus. They result from increased pressure in the rectal area, which can cause the veins to stretch and bulge. Hemorrhoids are classified into two main types: Internal Hemorrhoids: Painless rectal bleeding (bright red blood in stools or on toilet paper). Mucus discharge. Sensation of incomplete evacuation. Prolapse (may be reducible or irreducible). External Hemorrhoids: Painful swelling or lump at the anal verge. Acute pain if thrombosed. Itching or irritation around the anus. Complications: Anemia due to chronic bleeding. Thrombosis and necrosis. Infection or abscess formation

### Investigation

Clinical Examination: Inspection: Identify external hemorrhoids or prolapsed internal hemorrhoids. Digital Rectal Examination (DRE): Palpate for masses, tenderness, or other abnormalities. Anoscopy: Direct visualization of internal hemorrhoids and the anal canal. Proctoscopy or Sigmoidoscopy: Evaluate the rectum and sigmoid colon for other pathologies (e.g., polyps, tumors). Colonoscopy (if indicated): Rule out colorectal cancer in patients with significant rectal bleeding or other suspicious symptoms. Laboratory Tests: Complete Blood Count (CBC): Assess for

anemia due to chronic blood loss.

### Homoeopathic Approach to Hemorrhoids Management

These remedies are chosen based on the patient's unique symptoms, constitution, and overall health. Case studies and small-scale trials have reported significant symptom relief in patients treated with these remedies. Individualized treatment is essential, considering the patient's physical and mental symptoms.

*Aesculus hippocastanum* is Indicated for hemorrhoids with severe backache, venous congestion, and a sensation of fullness in the rectum. Suitable for cases with dry, aching rectal pain and minimal bleeding.

*Hamamelis virginiana* Effective in managing bleeding hemorrhoids with soreness and a bruised feeling. Often used for varicose veins and venous congestion.

*Aloe socotrina* is Indicated for protruding, swollen hemorrhoids that are relieved by cold applications. Beneficial for cases with burning pain and frequent urge for defecation.

Sulphur is Useful for hemorrhoids associated with itching, burning, and a sensation of heat in the anal region. Often prescribed for patients with a sedentary lifestyle.

*Nux vomica* is Ideal for cases where hemorrhoids are associated with constipation and irritability. Indicated for patients with a history of excessive alcohol or spice consumption.

### Clinical Evidence Supporting Homoeopathy in Haemorrhoids

Several case studies and clinical trials have demonstrated the effectiveness of homeopathic remedies in alleviating symptoms of hemorrhoids.
