4. Arsenicum Album

Arsenicum album is indicated when psoriasis presents with marked anxiety and restlessness.

Clinical Relevance

Effective in cases with intense burning, anxiety, and frequent relapses.

5. Sepia

- Better from exercise
- Associated menstrual irregularities

Clinical Relevance

Indicated in psoriasis associated with hormonal imbalance and emotional exhaustion.

6. Lycopodium

Lycopodium suits patients with digestive disturbances and lack of confidence.

Key Indications:

- Craving for sweets and warm food
- Right-sided complaints
